Kehkashan Basu (United Arab Emirates/Canada).

Kehkashan Basu is a young (18 year-old) advocate for peace and sustainable development. She is the winner of the 2016 Children's Peace Prize, a former United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) Global Coordinator for Children & Youth, Youth Director for the NGO Committee on Sustainable Development-NY and a United Nations Human Rights Champion for her work on protecting children's rights. In UAE she founded HOPE, a children's environmental organisation which is now active across the Middle East and internationally. She moved to Canada in 2017, and last month was named as one of Canada's Top 25 Women of Influence for 2018.

Ms Basu has been invited by the President of the UN General Assembly to come to New York City to be one of the two representatives from civil society to address the *UN High Level Meeting on Nuclear Disarmament* on September 26. She is also a participant in the <u>Global Goals World Cup</u> in NYC on September 25.

Christopher Salata (USA)

Christopher is co-founder of <u>Peace Accelerators</u>, a youth-led initiative dedicated to accelerate the culture of peace worldwide through nonviolence education and connecting diversity and cultures across the Earth. One of their main projects is to make the International Day for Peace an international holiday. Peace accelerators also has a project to support farms not arms.

Mónica Rouco (Spain/USA)

Mónica Rouco, PhD, is the Assistant Director of the K=1 Project, a center based at Columbia University with the mission of engaging undergraduate students, and ultimately the public, in informed, scientifically-guided discussion of the issues surrounding nuclear technologies, with a special emphasis in nuclear weapons and disarmament. Mónica's professional career has focused on global issues such as climate change research in the ocean and now nuclear technologies. Mónica has a strong commitment to education. In all her projects she has taught and worked closely with undergraduate students and in an international setting. At the K=1 Project, Mónica manages research and educational projects that aim at increasing awareness about nuclear issues among the youth in NYC and around the globe.
